

The National September 11 Memorial & Museum cordially invites you to a public program 'Holding Back the Hudson' on May 6, 2019.

Remnants of the original World Trade Center are embedded throughout the 9/11 Memorial Museum. This is seen most visibly in the Slurry Wall, a retaining wall built in the late 1960s to hold back the waters of the Hudson River. Though damaged on 9/11, the Slurry Wall did not breach, and over time became a symbol of endurance and human resolve. In celebration of National Historic Preservation Month, a group of panelists will discuss the unique history of the Slurry Wall and examine how historical events and collective memory can elevate places and objects from the mundane to the sacred.
